Does not list database/web source
Date is missing
Not double spaced

Winston gives you **info.** about the health effects of a vegan diet on people. He talks about **cancer** **diabetes** and **b** being overweight. He talks about heart disease and how eating nuts has a positive impact on the heart and because vegans eat lots of nuts they are going to have lower rates of disease.

Do not abbreviate words. Be sure to check spelling and punctuation. Do not use texting abbreviations.

The article is a good article for this topic. **U** can tell because the article title is "health effects of vegan diets." The reader knows exactly what the article will be about. It was **published in** recently in 2009. It tells you a lot of information that can be used. This is a college level article.

Double spaced.

This annotation tells us very little about the article and fails to make a clear connection to the research question. The author's first name is used; use the last name of the author. No evidence is provided to substantiate the claim that the article is relevant to the topic and a high quality, academic article. Writing is not college level and does not demonstrate critical thinking.
