

ASC 101: Common Reading Annotated Bibliography – 28 points

PURPOSE: To enhance critical reading skills, information literacy and research skills, and argumentative writing skills through an exploration of the common reading's themes.

What is an evaluative annotated bibliography?

"An annotated bibliography is a list of citations to books, articles, and documents. Each citation is followed by a brief descriptive and evaluative paragraph, the annotation. The purpose of the annotation is to inform the reader of the relevance, accuracy, and quality of the sources cited."

- c. One scholarly article
- d. One source of your choice (i.e. a video, podcast, website, personal interview, another book, another article, etc.)

4. State your thesis on the annotated bibliography.



5. Write an evaluative annotation for **each source**. Your annotation should include:



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- a. **Summary of the Main Points**: What is the source about? Clearly explain the source's main points. This might include key insights, unique information, interesting facts, purpose, etc.
- b. **Critical Evaluation:** Why is the source worth including in your research? Give a critical evaluation of the source's value as an appropriate information source for your topic and academic research. Consider the source's currency, relevance, authority, accuracy, purpose, and objectivity. Include evidence to back up your opinion.
- 6. **Grading**: A rubric will be used to grade the bibliography. Please review the rubric to be sure you understand the requirements.
